



The election of the Chairman of the Board in 2023 was uncontested and

unanimous that had the making that the 2023- 2025 term was easy, smooth and stress free. This was not totally the case because the contentious issues that arose in the proposed new website and the fifty-year- old website that began three years ago was immediately resuscitated at the very onset of this administration. This became disruptive and consumed most of the time that almost forestalled us to move ahead in performing our functions, duties and responsibilities. To our beloved Medicine alumni,

In case you missed it, there's a new sheriff in town for FEU-NRMF's flagship program – **Dean Pio T. Esguerra II and Vice Dean Mari Ann B. Bringas.**Previously, Dean Esguerra was at the helm of our successful Respiratory

Therapy program, bannering four (4) consecutive 100% overall passing rates from 2022-2025. Since the first respiratory therapy board exam in 2013, he has produced nineteen (19) topnotchers, but his most significant feat is that every graduate of the program, including retakers in earlier years, eventually passed. Notably, they are the only program in our storied history that can claim that not a single alumnus/alumna has been left behind. While the number of takers is disproportionate, there is no harm in hoping that he is able to replicate that success for Medicine.

Meanwhile, Vice Dean Bringas previously chaired the Biochemistry Department and the Admissions Committee. Having a former basic department chair in the significant role could help establish a more balanced curriculum with lesser focus on specialist or residency-level education, unnecessary subject content, and realignment with the expectations of the Professional Regulation Commission. We've noticed that the number of units of our better performing programs like Respiratory Therapy, Medical Laboratory Science, and Nursing are closer to the Commission on Higher Education's minimum requirement. While it may be premature to conclude that debulking our curriculum would lead to better results, the data on our outstanding programs present a compelling case.

In other news, we shall be launching the new and unified FEU-NRMF alumni card for all programs on July 25, 2025, which coincides with our graduation ceremony. Recently, we've gotten together with our relatives from FEU Manila and our own familial reunion led to their Alumni Office extending

the perks and privileges of their partners to us. Gone are the days where all you could do with an FEU-NRMF alumni card was visit the library.

We shall also be conferring our very first honorary doctorate, with no less than **Mr. Fernando M. Zóbel de Ayala, Chairman of AC Health**, being the honorand and recipient of Doctor of Healthcare Management (Honoris Causa). In line with CHED's guidance, this has triggered our application for our first doctoral program. Previously, FEU-NRMF had eight degree (8) programs and Senior High School. Today, we may have dropped Grades 11 and 12 from our roster to focus on tertiary-level education or higher, yet we have managed to increase our offerings to thirteen (13). Our flagship Doctor of Medicine and Accelerated Pathway for Medicine (APMED) under the School of Medicine; Medical Laboratory Science, Nursing, Physical Therapy, Respiratory Therapy, Nutrition and Dietetics, Pharmacy, Radiologic Technology, Psychology at the undergraduate level; Master in Nursing, Master of Healthcare Management, and Master of Public Health for graduate studies; and hopefully, a PhD in Healthcare Management by Research in AY 26-27 becomes the fourteenth (14th).

Finally, we ask for your prayers and support as we explore the possibility of having a second campus. In any enterprise, if you are not growing, you are dying, the speed of which may be relative depending on the industry. Fortunately for us, we are bent on capitalizing on the growing demand for healthcare professionals worldwide. While we have yet to reach the full capacity of our campus in Fairview, we would like to expand our horizons and afford students from other locations the opportunity to experience an FEU-NRMF education without having to brave the traffic or be away from their families just because we are too far. We are also firm believers in the adage that fortune favors the bold. With the proper faith, intentions, strategy, execution, and luck, we should be able to pull off the balancing act between managing our debt repayments and starting a new branch. Here's to brighter days. Ad Astra Per Aspera!

# THE TARGET - FROM GOLDEN TO DIAMOND AND ONTO PLATINUM JUBILEE

I used to write a column in our newsletter way back in the early 1990s under the above title and I want to fill up my pen with ink and relive my desire to write again.

Our Diamond Jubilee celebration went well including our group dancing the waltz. Although we enjoyed and bantered the few days we were with each other, tolerating each other's little foibles, we missed our classmates who were not able to attend for one reason or another. The realities of being an octogenarian suddenly crossed my mind, delving into

another. The realities of being an octogenarian suddenly crossed my mind, delving into benefits and freebies we are due as we entered our dotage, the aches and pains we endured, the days and weeks filled with doctor's appointments. I couldn't help but think about the reasons for their absence in a very significant event in our lives.

Reaching the age of 80 is a blessing. We have surpassed the average life expectancy in the United States by a few years. Men who are 80 years old this year are expected to live 7.74 more years. Women of the same age are expected to live 9.1 more years. At 85 years of age, men are expected to live 5.47 more years and 6.44 years for women (Source-Office of Social Security US Gov't). As you can see, women outlive men and this is true in other countries. In a jocular way, I have always told my friends that during married life, women love their husbands so much that they feed them a lot of bacon and eggs at breakfast.

Joking aside, there are so-called Blue Zones where men and women live to 100 or more and where chronic diseases are not rampant. They certainly live longer than the general population and are mobile and move easily. They are found in Okinawa (Japan), Sardinia (Italy), Ikaria (Greece), Nicoya (Costa Rica) and Loma Linda in California. A researcher from University College London became curious and investigated the aging seniors who claim to have reached this age. He found out that only 20% of the people over 110 had a birth certificate. Record keeping on blue zone theories was not consistent with the US, Italy, France, England and Japan. So what is to believe in living to 100 or more? Would a nutritious diet, exercise and socialization add more years to your life? Recent data say they do. What about intermittent fasting or keto diets? An article in the journal Science in 2021 showed it did not have any positive results with these diets. Are you still doing 10,000 steps a day? Recently, 6000 to 8000 steps a day would suffice to keep you healthy but more wouldn't hurt either if you are into it. Even drinking wine in moderation is now touted bad especially for the

aging senior citizen according to a Global Burden of Disease Study. In addition, supplements such as Vitamin E and beta carotene are not beneficial and may even be harmful according to the US Preventive Services Task Force. You must have seen TV ads about how supplements such as different fruits and vegetables are placed in a pill and taken like a drug. I would rather eat and enjoy the taste of the real fruit and vegetables, wouldn't you? Prevagen for cognition is also under scrutiny by the Federal Trade Commission and by the New York State General's office for false advertising. There are three key points that longevity scientists discovered. They are Resilience, Love and Faith. Resilience is defined as the capacity to withstand or to recover quickly from difficulties; toughness.

**RESILIENCE** - people who are mentally tough tend to live longer, especially women. They tend to stay calm under pressure, living through difficult times and life challenges (remember during Japanese occupation in the 1940s), financial hardship, etc. They are not discouraged and always hoping and working for a better future. To summarize it, Biology reminds us of the concept "Hormesis", exemplified as "what doesn't kill you makes you stronger". Examples of those who experienced a lot of extreme stress were holocaust survivors, World War II survivors and older black Americans. I would like to add here the stresses we experienced during our medical school years, the bullying of a few of our professors, the scheduled examinations one has to pass and the financial burden of enrolling for the next semester or the following school year.

**LOVE** - There are many definitions of love but to be loved brings a sense of contentment, happiness, a feeling of being accepted by an individual or by a group or society in spite of your flaws. When a person experiences love, the brain releases dopamine, oxytocin and serotonin. Dopamine is the "reward hormone" because we feel that pleasure. Oxytocin is the "love hormone" that makes you trust a person, connect with him/her and bond with others. Serotonin tends to decrease initially when one is in love and then normalizes as the relationship goes on. Long lasting happy marriages seem to favor longevity. Single persons who have good, happy family and social connections tend to live longer. Cognitively, they are in good if not in excellent conditions.

FAITH - Decades ago, I read somewhere that NUNS live longer than any other group. This may be true because of their faith in God. Research from Ohio State University found that faith in one's religion adds 9 years to a person's life. Women who regularly attended religious services had a 33% lower mortality rate. People who had positive outlooks had a 50-70% greater odds of reaching age 85 than the least optimistic groups in a study by Boston University School of Medicine psychologist Lewina Lee. If you ask me how I get to be in my 80's, I would definitely tell you, occasional lunch or dinner with my friends, playing canasta or mahjong on a weekly schedule or so, visit to my son's family and especially to our grandchild or vice versa, reading before I go to sleep at night which really makes me sleep

like a baby, accompanying and/or driving my wife and our friends shopping. I always bring my computer when I take them shopping to fight boredom waiting to finish their buying binge.

To my fellow octogenarians who were present during the Diamond Jubilee (title of Dr omitted for brevity), Betty Cardenas Kalata, Rey Maniquiz, Roly and Thelma Mupas, Myrna Coronado Parungao, Ruth Urbiztondo, Melanie Valerian, Pascual and Remedios Sales, Elvy Valino, Melvin Antonio, Norma Pacia, Virgilio Jonson, Jose Bernal and Lito Morilla, let us try to attend our yearly reunion. It is always a pleasure to see all of you. Perhaps next time when we do not have to worry about being jubilarians, we can rent a room to exchange pleasantries, a soiree or even go out for a group lunch or dinner. For now, take care of your health and everything else and prepare for the Platinum Jubilee as always dreamed of by many of us, especially Remy. Chao.
